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Plum Tree Removal at Fish Ladder Park

Fish Ladder Park is located at the corner of HWY 527 and Mill Creek Road and serves as the main entrance to MCCA. The park's east side (directly across from The Laurels entrance) was lined with Thundercloud Plum trees that were looking past their prime.

The plum trees had many dead spots. We asked Taylor's Tree Service to examine them to see if they would benefit from hard pruning, but the trees were too old and diseased for this to work well.

According to various online sources, the Thundercloud Plum has a life span of about 20 years, which these trees passed long ago. After a close inspection of the trees, Craig and I noticed that a few of them were leaning toward the street and a few of them had rot issues, as in the pictures below. We have lost a few of these trees in recent years due to wind and snow.

Since these trees were well past their prime and were starting to fail in windstorms and under snow loads, we removed the six Thundercloud Plum trees and will replace them with a line of Armstrong Maples (or similar tree), which are thriving at other locations in MCCA. The new trees are on order and will be planted after we can schedule the stump grinding.

MAINTENANCE UPDATE

If you missed the Annual Meeting, here's a brief recap of what your hard-working Maintenance team has been working on this last fiscal year:

Bridge Traction Pads This January, we were able to complete our multi-year project to upgrade our rubberized traction walking pads to all of our wooden bridges. The project was completed by finishing the two wooden bridges in the Chatham Preserve.

Basketball hoop installation In April of 2024 Red Cedar Park received a new basketball hoop. This was installed by MCCA maintenance and now provides an opposing hoop for the previously single hooped court.

Huckleberry wall In May, Huckleberry's Brick monuments and stone retaining wall were replaced.

Cherry bridge beam a faulty beam was discovered at the Vine maple to Huckleberry bridge. Close to failure from rot, we scheduled it to be replaced In June of 2024. MCCA maintenance performed the beam replacement.

Cherry Pond Project The Cherry Pond flow control structure, culvert replacement and clean out project is now wrapped up. This project has been in the works since July of 2022 and was projected to be a multi-season project when we discovered that our flow control structure had begun to fail underground and drain

the pond below grade. The second phase of this project addressed replacing the failing culverts and broken sidewalks in August of 2024. We finished up the project with turf repairs, stump grinding and general clean-up.

Clearing Projects /Critter Corridor Between Huckleberry lots 77 and 78, The planting of specific forage plants that are beneficial to animals are scheduled to be planted this Fall. Having an environmentally themed purpose coupled with our clearing projects is not only good for the environment, but good for our residents who will hopefully experience some memorable wildlife viewings!

Tree Planting This fiscal year, MCCA maintenance planted 204 trees with a majority being native species. We also planted 162 native undergrowth plants such as Salal, Sword Fern, Pacific Wax Myrtle, and Snowberry. The "100 Tree Policy" is our goal to purchase and plant 100 native trees every year. This will benefit future generations with an abundance of legacy trees.

Storm Water Maintaining our storm water facilities through our quarterly inspections and maintenance, is a critical task for maintaining our infrastructure and protecting the environment. Line trimming of grass, brush removal, tree removal, litter pickup, and repairs to our many stone checks are just a few of the maintenance actions performed to keep our systems in compliance.

Mail hutches Our hutch program has been moving along steadily with varying speeds of building and installation depending on seasonal constraints. We are currently at 92% completion of this project. Of the 181 wooden hutches we have, 166 have been repaired or replaced.

The MCCA maintenance department is focused on safety for our residents, staff, and the aesthetics of this community. Thank you for your continued support!

COVENANT COMMITTEE

Project Submittals

Please remember that MCCA **REQUIRES** residents to apply for **any major exterior changes.** NOT applying can be costly! If you have any questions, don't hesitate to contact us at the MCCA office: <u>info@mcca.info</u> or (425) 316-3344. Projects that require approval include but are not limited to fencing, exterior painting, sheds (or any structure), landscaping (including pathways and concrete block or retaining walls), and more. Even if you are replacing existing exterior structures or elements, you must still apply. Please check <u>here</u> for the appropriate forms you may need for any upcoming projects.

Political Signage

Election season is upon us! As a reminder, political yard signs are allowed 60 days before and three days following the general election. The sign must be placed a minimum of 10 feet from the street, and the height may not be more than 4 feet above the ground. The total sign area for an individual residence may not exceed 6 square feet. **All political signs must be removed by November 8.**

Yard and Exterior Maintenance

We understand that keeping up with your landscaping throughout the fall and winter months can be a cold and wet task at times, but it must be done in order to keep your yard looking its best and to ensure that you are compliant per our covenant restrictions. Mowing, edging and weeding is necessary as long as lawn and weeds continue to grow. If you plan to be away during the winter months, please remember to schedule regular yard maintenance in your absence. All members are expected to maintain their property throughout the year!

Fall Clean-up

While maintaining your property is required all year around, there are a few tasks that should be completed before winter:

- $\sqrt{}$ Clean roof
- $\sqrt{}$ Weed beds, deadhead or prune any seasonal plants and dispose of debris
- $\sqrt{}$ Replant containers with fall/winter plants or store the pots away
- √ Fall lawn restoration/re-seeding and winterizing: The Covenant Committee expects members whose lawns went dormant over the summer to be restored by now. If this is not the case with your lawn, this is a clear violation of the MCCA Restrictive Covenants. If you need advice on lawn care, give us a call!
- $\sqrt{}$ Fall mulching beds: Mulching your beds is not only beneficial to the health of your plants, but it will help impede the growth of weeds well into Spring!
- ✓ Moss removal: This is an excellent time to eliminate any moss, mildew, or mold on walkways, roofs, and exterior siding, as it tends to build up over the fall and winter. Over the last two years, I have paid close attention to the moss growth, and in 2022, it didn't start taking off in growth until November. Last year, the moss growth started in October. Once you start seeing green, we suggest applying some baking soda because the moss can resemble a green carpet within just a few months! Not only is this a violation, but it can also rot your roof and siding and be a safety hazard for you, your family, and your friends, especially on your sidewalks and driveways. Please take steps now to remove moss.

COVENANT COMMITTEE (CONT.)

Only Rain Down the Drain!

Storm water does not receive any treatment before entering your local waterways, so don't let anything go down the drain except rain. This includes:

- Bark, mulch, or soil (dispose of any yard waste and debris that collects at the curb).
- Trash (if it is yours, pick it up)
- Pet waste (pick up your pet poo!)
- Any waste, paints, fluids, soap or pollution of any kind!

Residents are responsible for ensuring that any service provider or contractor hired does not pollute the storm drain system! Think exterior painting, exterior pressure washing, concrete work, landscape work, etc.

Sediment filter socks are products you or a contractor can use to protect storm drains in front of your home from debris. Here are a couple of options to consider:

A MESSAGE FROM TRAIL AMBASSADORS

Mill Creek Wildlife

The Great Horned Owl is probably the most recognizable owl species found in Washington, and it is definitely the largest. The feathery "horns" on its head give the owl its name and distinctive silhouette. The golden-yellow eyes of the Great Horned Owl are another distinguishing characteristic. Primarily feeding on small rodents, these owls will also pursue small birds and snakes. It's important to note that these owls have been known to pluck unattended cats and small dogs from yards – another great reason not to leave pets unattended and/or off leash!

Residents who frequent the MCCA Nature Preserve are likely familiar with these owls. Residents have reported seeing and hearing these majestic and mysterious birds while out on early morning and early evening walks. And in some cases, walkers have reported owls "dive-bombing" them. Territorial owl behavior is not uncommon, especially in the fall and spring. Generally speaking, waving your arms and making loud noise does the trick to ward off these hooting hooligans.

Great Horned Owl Fun Facts:

- These owls mate for life.
- The female of the species is larger than the male.
- They can hear a mouse stepping on a twig from 75 feet away.
- They swallow their prey whole and then regurgitate pellets of indigestible material, like bones and fur, 6 to 10 hours later.

The Barred Owl is another owl species found in Mill Creek. This owl doesn't usually like to share habitat with the Great Horned Owl, and will frequently move to a different part of its territory when a Great Horned Owl is nearby. The Barred Owl has round black eyes and a round head. This owl species has recently made the news as their population in Washington seems to be growing at the expense of the Spotted Owl population.

If you walk the Nature Preserve in the early morning hours, you have the best chance of spotting some of our resident Barred Owls. The lighter colored feathers of the Barred Owl can make them easier to spot in the forest. The Barred Owl is less aggressive than the Great Horned Owl, but have been known to dive and swoop at humans who happen to be walking in their territory. Always use caution when sharing space with any wild animal.

Barred Owl Fun Facts:

- These owls mate for life.
- The female of the species is larger than the male.
- They can swoop down on prey from their perch, catch their prey mid-air, and wade into shallow water to catch fish and crayfish.
- They enjoy feasting on rats and other small critters and help to keep the rodent population in check.





NOXIOUS WEED COMMITTEE

"An Alligator in the Bathtub"

That's how Leland cypress is described in this short article: <u>https://www.tree133.com/post/leyland-cypress-an-alligator-in-the-bathtub</u>. Inexpensive. Fast growing. Readily available at box stores. Sounds good, right? Not so fast. Because of their potential size and being planted either too close together or too close to walkways, driveways, fences or other structures, the Leland cypress can cause serious damage and can often lead to neighbor disputes. You may think that keeping them pruned to a reasonable size is feasible, but this means frequent and often costly maintenance. Please carefully consider whether this non-native tree is right for your yard and always apply first if you are planning a hedge or planting Leland cypress on your property.

Throughout MCCA, we have noticed many situations where trees of all kinds have either been planted or are volunteers growing in unsuitable locations as shown in the photos below. These trees will soon pose problems for the walkways, driveways and utilities nearby. Remember that trees should be placed at least 10 feet back from walkways, driveways or structures.



Mulching Your Trees?

Creating a donut of mulch around the tree so that rainwater can collect and soak slowly and deeply into the roots is best. The outer edge of the donut hole should be at the drip line of the tree. A volcano of mulch prevents the rainwater from soaking into the roots, and the tree will suffer and may even die.



Message from South County Fire

Home Safety - Fall & Winter Edition

Home fires can happen to anyone, at any time, but they generally increase during the fall and winter months. South County Fire offers the following tips to keep you and your family safe from home fires:

- Have working smoke alarms in every room in the home. Test alarms monthly and replace smoke alarms that are more than 10 years from the manufacture date.
- Plug space heaters directly into an electrical outlet, never into an extension cord, and never leave running while sleeping. Keep at least 3 feet from anything that can burn.
- Have a qualified professional clean and inspect your chimney and vents each year. Burn only clean, dry firewood and follow imposed burn bans when applicable.
- Plan and practice your home fire escape with the whole family.
- During a power outage, avoid using candles. If using a portable generator, keep it outside, away from windows, and as far away from your home as possible.
- Locate the fire hydrant near your home and if needed, clear away overgrown grasses or weeds so firefighters can locate it quickly in a fire.
- Be sure your house numbers are visible from the street.

This time of year, we have the potential for windstorms, excessive rain, snow and ice. The safest thing is to stay home and off the road. Stock up on all necessary food, toiletry items, prescriptions and items for your pets. Less people on the road means less emergencies that our firefighters need to respond to, which keeps them safer, too.

All About Bats

Attention all ghosts and goblins! The Bat Lady will be at the Adopt A Stream Foundation's Northwest Stream Center at 1:00 PM, Saturday October 12 located in Snohomish County's McCollum Park, 600 128th Street SE, Everett WA 98208. The *Bat Lady* also goes by the name of Barbara Ogaard. She rehabilitates injured bats for the Sarvey Wildlife Center and is a researcher for Bat's Northwest. "The Bat Lady puts on quite a show," says Adopt A Stream Foundation Director Tom Murdoch. "Barbara has this unique ability to engage little kids and old gray beards at the same time." Live bats will be part of the presentation along with incredible photo images of bats from around the world and some very cool bat puppets. Murdoch advises that this is a very entertaining event!

Attend this show and you will learn that bats are beneficial in many ways. "One of my favorite foods is bananas" says Murdoch. "After learning from the *Bat Lady* that Fruit Bats pollinate banana trees, I became a big bat fan." They also pollinate breadfruit, avocados, dates, figs, peaches, and mangoes. In the tropics, bats spread seeds for trees that are essential for the rain forests. In North America bats control insects...a single Mouse Eared bat can eat up to 600 mosquitoes in an hour!

The whole family will learn that we really don't need to be worried about vampire bats. Real vampires are only found in the tropics, and they don't care for human blood...sorry Dracula, there are no vampires in Transylvania...and vampire saliva is being used in the development of a new medicine for people with heart disease! At the bat show you will see that while many bats are scary to look at, others are very beautiful, and some are so cute that they will bring a big smile to your face!

Registration proceeds benefit Sarvey Wildlife Center and the NW Stream Center. Plus, everyone who attends will get to go on an amazing *Nature Trail* before or after the bat show!!

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
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
