Q: Why doesn't MCCA keep cars off the streets in our subdivision? People should park in their garage or driveway.

A: We understand that cars parked in the roadway can quickly clog up a neighborhood. We highly recommend that residents be respectful of their neighbors and adhere to city parking regulations. MCCA does not have any restrictions over the streets or street parking. Street parking is regulated by the City of Mill Creek Municipal Code and enforced by the Mill Creek Police Department.







13. I support having an MCCA Community Hours event for residents attended by both the Association Director and the Board of Directors at least once a year.



MAINTENANCE UPDATE

Fall Planting Has Begun!

MCCA Maintenance recently planted a line of Red Rocket Maples in Fish Ladder Park near the intersection of Hwy 527 and Mill Creek Road. Red Rocket maples have all the characteristics of the red maple but with a slender, conical shape. They produce large clusters of red flowers that look like little fireworks popping out in the early spring followed by big, green leaves throughout the summer. In the fall, we can expect a burst of brilliant red color. They typically grow to a height of 30-35 feet with a spread of around 15-20 feet at maturity.

Division Entries: Holiday Lighting

We love that residents get into the holiday spirit, take pride in their neighborhood, and decorate in celebration of the season. As we prepare for the holidays, there are several things residents should keep in mind when they decorate division entries for the holidays:

- Do not unplug any plug that is already in the outlet. This is the power for MCCA entry lighting.
- Do not use old worn out lights as they tend to trip the GFCI outlet which will also shut down the entry lights as they are on the same circuit.
- Do not change or tamper with MCCA timers on the back of the walls. If lights need timers, residents need to provide a timer for their lights.
- Lights, timers, extension cords, and surge protectors need to be exterior rated for the safety of our residents and so they don't trip the GFCI or breaker.
- Do not leave MCCA outlets that have weather covers open or overload the outlet so the cover cannot shut.
- For the safety of all, any lights that impair the proper functioning of the entry lights or circuitry, or cause an electrical hazard, will be removed by maintenance.

Be prepared this winter! The Red Cross has tips on how to stay safe during cold spells:


Tis the Season for Car Prowlers!

We have had reports of car break-ins recently so we're sharing these general tips on prevention:

- Lock your car doors
- Do not leave valuables in plain sight
- Remove or hide anything that a car prowler might mistake as something worth stealing
- Audible alarms or other theft-deterrents can be effective
- Do not leave remote controls for garages in your car
- If you can't park in your garage, increase visibility of your driveway by trimming back trees or shrubs
- If you're parking in a public lot, don't put packages or purse in trunk, then walk away

Safety at Your Residence

- If most of your holiday shopping is done online, consider having packages delivered to your place of work or have a neighbor pick-up for you in your absence.
- Remember to check your front porch before bed. Many deliveries are now made late in the evening.
- If leaving town, fill out a vacation house check request. Have security or someone check your house daily while you are away. Use timers to keep lights on in the evening and consider parking a car in your driveway.
- Cut back shrubs and make sure home exterior lights are on and in working order—consider updating with motion sensor.



Speed Limit Reminder and Pedestrian Safety

It is that time of year again when it is both dark in the morning and at night. Please remember to drive the speed limit and consider reducing your speed even lower. If you're walking in the dark, consider wearing reflective clothing for yourself, your children, and pets. Wearing a headlamp is a great way to light your path, while keeping your hands free. Stay on the sidewalks when available. Stay alert and aware of your surroundings.

Political Signage

By now, all political signage should be removed from your property. Many thanks to our residents for getting those signs stowed away shortly after the election.

The Holiday Season is here!

Please remember that MCCA does allow lights for other holidays, not just Christmas. The following rule applies to all holidays:

Holiday light displays do not require an application. Residents may start installing winter holiday lights in November but cannot turn them on until Thanksgiving weekend. All winter holiday displays must be removed by January 31. Other holidays during the year may be celebrated with light displays installed two weeks before the holiday and removed two weeks after the holiday.

Moss

While moss can be a beautiful addition to your landscape, having many benefits to the environment, it can also harm building materials. Moss can weigh down roofs, displace shingles, and lead to rot. Expansion of moss on driveways can cause stress on concrete, leading to cracking and deterioration. The committee is seeing many homes where moss is beginning to take hold and spread. Be proactive by using baking soda! Baking soda is a powerful and natural cleaner that we use at the MCCA for a fast and safe solution for moss removal. Simply sprinkle the baking soda over your entire driveway, walkways, and decks and let nature take its course. Regularly sweeping and blowing debris from your pavement and deck can also help prevent mossy buildup. You may want to consider having your roof professionally cleaned.

Storm Drains

The fall rains have begun. Please check the storm drains near your home. If they are clogged with debris, take a moment to scoop the debris and put if in your yard waste. The heavy rains we have had lately quickly overwhelm clogged drains.

Have Extra Yard Waste?

After a big wind storm, you might find yourself with more yard waste than will fit in your green bin. Did you know that Waste Management will pick-up any extra yard trimmings beyond your basic service? Visit <u>Waste Management</u> for more details on allowable containers, weight restrictions and any additional fees.

Reminder List of Winter Tasks

- Yard cleanup
- Store all empty pots, yard tools, and other seasonal items out of view from the street and neighboring properties
- Leaf, debris, and moss removal from sidewalks and driveways
- Gutter cleaning
- Cover outdoor faucets to prevent freezing & detach all hoses
- Lawn moss prevention with lime application

Tree Trimming Etiquette

With blustery fall days upon us, our yards can become littered with debris from fallen branches, pine needles, leaves, etc. Some of this debris may be coming from a neighbor's tree. Over time, branches from neighboring trees can grow beyond the property line into your yard. You can trim encroaching tree branches up to your property line as long as you do not kill or irreparably harm the tree. If this is the route you wish to take, we encourage you to speak with your neighbor BEFORE having any branches trimmed to make sure there is a clear understanding of the work to be done. To be on the safe side, consider consulting a licensed arborist to ensure that your trimming will not harm the tree. Once the trimming is complete, plan to put all debris in your yard waste bin. Do not throw the cuttings over the fence into your neighbor's yard or the common area.

Exterior Lighting

As a reminder, our lighting <u>Rules and Regulations</u> go into effect January 31, 2025. Please be considerate of your neighbors when planning the lightscape for your yard and position your lights to avoid shining them into your neighbor's windows.

Mill Creek Wildlife

Coyotes are a common sight throughout Snohomish County, including Mill Creek. These adaptable canines have increasingly moved into our residential areas as their natural habitats shrink and human development expands. Coyotes are opportunistic feeders, able to survive on a diet ranging from small mammals like rabbits and rodents to fruit, bird eggs, and even food scraps and garbage. Their ability to thrive in diverse habitats has made them a fixture in the local wildlife population, even as they coexist with humans.

Coyotes are typically more active at dawn and dusk, although they are seen at all times of day. They are solitary or travel in small family groups, and their distinctive yips, howls, and barks can be heard echoing across some of our neighborhoods. While they rarely pose a direct threat to humans, coyotes can be a threat to pets, especially small dogs and cats. To minimize conflict, experts recommend securing trash bins and keeping pets indoors or on a leash when outside. Despite being considered a nuisance by some, coyotes play an important ecological role by controlling rodent populations and maintaining balance in our local ecosystems.

ARBORIST INSIGHTS-SAL NOELDNER

A good day to you, Mill Creek Community Association member!

It is my great pleasure to be asked to share my thoughts on the challenges facing a healthy, partially forested landscape both in the city of Mill Creek and surrounding areas. As both a long-time Western Washington resident and tree-appreciating professional, I find the current decline of many tall trees, although saddening, can also be considered a drawn-out change that behooves us to act proactively to protect and support resiliency in current trees within our landscape, as much as possible, into our future. Complexing our efforts, unqualified tree service salespeople, layers of development, climate extremes, a growing homeless population, pathogens, and invasive plants are tree issues of concern that I will detail here over the upcoming months, including some simple modifications to tree-focused protocol for readers with the ability to act.

Often, I am called for a second opinion on a tree issue of concern, the client telling me about predatory tree service salespeople who have knocked on the residence door, soliciting some sort of tree work such as removal, "windsailing", spraying for insects, and "lifting" the tree canopy. So far, <u>every time</u> I have been called for a second opinion, I have found the former salespeople lacking in general decency and much like snake-oil salesmen trying to sell elixirs of miracle health at a country fair. The recommended tree removals for safety because of various, mis-diagnosed stressor(s), "windsailing" pruning (which means reoccurring work for the salesperson as response growth makes the area thicker in growth eventually and changes how the tree reacts to wind loading), spraying for insects (without either adding preventative care or identifying exactly how the insect use of the tree deviates from normal), and canopy "lifting" have not really been needed, create fear/ anxiety where there was little or none, and often decrease locally the quality of life for both tree and human. In contrast to unqualified sales marketing, an ISA Certified Arborist is invested with a Duty of Care and must tell you of an imminent chance of significant to severe damage if one is seen (I have only done this once in my career).

If you are looking for a qualified opinion of tree health or hazard potential, please go to <u>Find an Arborist</u> at ISA online and search for Certified Arborist in your area. An unqualified tree work salesperson will often say they are an "arborist" during introduction although no work is required to gain this definition. Either way, ask them for their ISA certification number, taking a photo of it when presented. If their concern is not framed in the manner I have said (there is an imminent likelihood of both tree failure and subsequent serious damage/ injury), and/or certification is not presented, it might behoove you as a responsible person to ask them to leave your property, because they are not really concerned for your safety, just concerned about earning a buck. At best, their recommended action might be innocuous for the tree and just cost money; at worst, you will lose your trees and the great many benefits they offer. If you find tree service salespeople lacking in decency or try to hard sell you something, PLEASE report any such "tree care" people to the Better Business Bureau (www.bbb.org). Let's see if we can rein in these unqualified doomsayers and get them to stop predating on the general populace, causing an even faster-decreasing canopy cover. Will you help me?

Message from South County Fire

Lithium-Ion Battery Fires – An Emerging Trend

Lithium-ion batteries are found in devices that we use on a daily basis. These batteries are an effective source of power however they can pose an increased fire risk due to the likelihood of overheating, catching fire, and even leading to explosions.

Fires caused by lithium-ion batteries are used to power micromobility devices such as e-bikes and escooters, smaller electronics such as cell phones and laptops, toys and electric vehicles.

The <u>National Fire Protection Association</u>[®] and South County Fire recommend these tips when buying, charging, storing, and using lithium-ion batteries to help prevent fires:

- Only purchase and use devices, batteries, and charging equipment that are listed by a nationally recognized testing lab and labeled accordingly.
- Use charging equipment that is only compatible with your device. To be safe, use only the charging equipment that is supplied with your device.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.
- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash. Recycling is always the best option. Take the batteries to a battery recycling location or contact your local waste department for disposal instructions. Many home improvement stores will accept these batteries.
- Stop using your device if the battery shows signs of damage, such as an unusual odor, excessive heat, popping sounds, swelling, or change in color.
- Only have device repairs performed by a qualified professional.

"South County Fire encourages residents to learn more about the hazards of lithium-ion batteries," said Deputy Fire Marshal, Jaret Vosburgh. "By better understanding how lithium-ion battery fires start, people can take the necessary steps to minimize associated risks and safely use their electronics and other devices powered by these batteries."

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



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
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
